Mid Century Modern Architecture Exhibit in April at Main Library

BROWARD COUNTY, FL – Broward County Libraries Division and Broward Trust for Historic Preservation, Inc. present the photography exhibit *Going, Going, Gone?* Mid Century Modern Architecture in Broward County, from April 2 to 24, in gallery 6 at Main Library, 100 S. Andrews Avenue, Fort Lauderdale.

The exhibit is a photographic journey through Broward County's signature architecture known as "Mid Century Modern" by acclaimed architectural photographer Robin Hill. The Broward Trust for Historic Preservation, Inc. commissioned Hill to document and showcase Broward County's nationally recognized architecture of the 1950's and 60's.

Mid Century Modern architecture, the exuberant style known as MiMo, sprang from a post World War II building boom that lasted from 1945 to 1972. Characterized by a preoccupation with rhythm, speed and the space race combined with new construction technologies and innovative use of decorative concrete, aluminum and glass, the style created a regional architecture that is often whimsical and playful. This architecture defined South Florida as a hub of postwar leisure, entertainment and style.
